# HB3215 REP. SLAUGHTER & REP. AMMONS

#### THE SAFER COMMUNITIES & SMALL BUSINESS ACT

HB 3215 would establish a living wage job creation program for up to 16,000 formerly incarcerated workers, and offer employers wage subsidies for hiring workers with conviction records into new, high-quality jobs. The bill would also provide targeted grants to small businesses that hire formerly incarcerated workers to help cover the cost of on-the-job training.

### FAIR JOB ACCESS FOR RETURNING ILLINOISANS

REMOVE BARRIERS TO EMPLOYMENT



Unemployment among people with conviction records is five times the overall national rate. Half of all returning Illinoisans are unable to obtain stable employment within 8 months of release.

Those who do secure work, earn significantly lower wages. Incarceration cuts a workers annual earnings by 40%

EQUITABLE JOB ACCESS REDUCES RECIDIVISM

Without fair access to jobs, 43% of re-entering Illinoisans will return to prison within 3 years. This cycle of re-incarceration undermines the safety and economic stability of re-entering individuals, as well as their families and communities.


